H. Gene Stringer Jr, MD, is Associate Professor of Clinical Medicine and, since 1998, Chief of the Infectious Diseases Section in the Department of Medicine at Morehouse School of Medicine (MSoM). Between 2008 and 2010, he served as co-principal investigator (Co-PI) of the MSoM regional performance site within the former Howard University–based National Minority AIDS Education and Training Center (NMAETC) network. Between 2005 and 2014, Dr. Stringer served (along with Dr. Fransua) as Co-Medical Director of the 400-client Joye Bradley Health Services Clinic at AID Atlanta, Inc., the largest and most comprehensive AIDS service organization in the southeastern United States. Since 1992, Dr. Stringer has served as an attending physician at Atlanta’s Grady Memorial Hospital, a flagship hospital of one of the largest public health systems in the United States. He also serves as Co-PI of GAETC and, since November 2015, as clinic physician in the Specialty (Ryan White) Clinic at Clayton County, Georgia, Board of Health.

Dr. Stringer earned his Bachelor of Science degree in biology cum laude from Belhaven University in Jackson, Mississippi, in 1979, and his medical degree from the University of Mississippi School of Medicine in 1984. He completed his first 2 years of internal-medicine residency at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, Texas; his third year of internal-medicine residency at Faulkner Hospital in Boston, Massachusetts; and his fellowship in infectious diseases at the University of Louisville School of Medicine in Louisville, Kentucky, in 1992. Dr. Stringer has been a member of the medical honor society Alpha Omega Alpha since 1983. He received the 1999 MSoM Faculty Recognition Award for Outstanding Contributions to Clinical Research and completed the Arusha (Tanzania) International Course on Tuberculosis Control, sponsored annually by the International Union against Tuberculosis and Lung Disease, in 2002.
