

Aaron E. Miller, MD, is Professor of Neurology at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai and Medical Director of the Corinne Goldsmith Dickinson Center for Multiple Sclerosis. He is widely recognized for his preeminence as an MS clinician and thought-leader.

Dr. Miller graduated from Brandeis University in 1964 and received his medical doctorate from New York University School of Medicine in 1968. Following his residency in neurology at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine, he received additional postdoctoral training in neurovirology and immunology at the Johns Hopkins University School of Hygiene and Public Health and at Einstein. During this time, he was the recipient of a fellowship from the National MS Society. For 23 years prior to joining Mount Sinai, Dr. Miller headed the Division of Neurology at Maimonides Medical Center in Brooklyn, NY where he continues to serve as Co-director of the MS Care Center.

Dr. Miller has been the Chief Medical Officer of the National MS Society (NMSS) since October 2001 and served as Chairman of the National Medical Advisory Board of the NMSS from 2001-2009. He has been a member of the NMSS Board of Directors since 2003, was Chairman of the Clinical Advisory Committee of the New York Chapter from 1991-2004, and is a Past President of the Consortium of MS Centers. He was the first Chairman of the MS section of the American Academy of Neurology, and has participated in numerous clinical trials of new treatments for MS.

Dr. Miller is a member of the Board of Directors for the American Academy of Neurology (AAN) and serves as Editor of the AAN's Continuum Audio. From 1997-2003, he was Co-chairman of the Education Committee and Chairman of the Annual Meeting Subcommittee of the AAN. Dr. Miller has served as Principal Investigator for many clinical trials in MS and has been a member of many data and safety monitoring boards. He is the co-author of 2 books on MS and related disorders and has published many peer-reviewed articles and book chapters.
