



Eileen Wang, MD, MPH is an Associate Professor of Medicine in the Division of Allergy and Immunology at National Jewish Health (NJH) and University of Colorado School of Medicine (CUSOM). Dr. Wang received her BA from Dartmouth College, her medical degree from the University of Michigan Medical School and her Master of Public Health degree from the University of Michigan School of Public Health. She completed her residency in internal medicine followed by a Chief year at the University of Chicago Internal Medicine Residency Program. She later completed a fellowship in Allergy and Clinical Immunology at National Jewish Health and the University of Colorado and was recruited to join the faculty.

She serves as a clinician with an area of focus on severe asthma, chronic rhinosinusitis with nasal polyps, and chronic cough; clinical and research mentor for the Allergy and Immunology Fellowship Program; core faculty, Health and Society small group facilitator, and longitudinal coach for medical students at CUSOM; principal investigator of several asthma longitudinal studies; and a member of the steering committee and representative for the U.S. for the International Severe Asthma Registry. Her research program focuses on real-world evidence of severe asthma outcomes, impacts of social determinants of health to include intimate partner violence, and community-based participatory research. She has presented her work nationally and internationally and published in high-impact peer-reviewed journals. Her work has been featured by the American Academy of Allergy, Asthma and Immunology; American College of Allergy, Asthma, and Immunology; Colorado Clinical and Translational Sciences Institute; and media.
